The Story of Waverly Road Presbyterian Church—The 80's, (Part 3 taken from Be Thou My Vision by Keene White)

In June the final ratification was accomplished in Atlanta and the breach dating from 1961 was closed. The newly constituted Presbyterian Church USA was the heir to long and strong traditions and the resolve that they might be the foundations of an even greater witness to Christ, the Lord of the Church, was felt throughout the land.

At the meeting of Session on July 24, 1983 Dale Hobbs, an Elder, announced his intention to enter Columbia Seminary in the summer of 1984 to prepare himself for ordination to the office of Minister of the Word and Sacraments. This was the fourth time our Session had been asked to endorse the intentions of one of the members of the congregation to seek such ordination.

On March 4, 1984 the congregation met to consider the request of Wylie Smith that the pastoral relationship be dissolved so that she might accept the call of Middleton Heights Church in Laurinburg, NC to be their Pastor. Wylie had been of great service to the church and its Lord during her time in Kingsport. Her good humor and sparkling wit had been good to have around on many occasions. She had been with us for over six years and felt herself to be a part of our families as we felt similarly toward her. In the best tradition of Waverly Road, a gala send off was planned in the shape of a "Wylie Roast" and no one will ever forget Dale Hobbs caricature performance. Wylie assured Dale that she would not forget and promised that there would come a day.

Our circumstances have changed through the years. For example, in years past we had volunteers fill positions that are now paid: Music Director, Youth Director, Children's Director, Bookkeeper, Nursery Workers. At various times leadership has determined that depending on volunteers for those time-intensive functions was not serving God's kingdom as well as we could.

A few other fun facts:

- Since 2013, 55 of our members and friends have died, and others have moved or transferred their membership. Some of those are still involved in some ways with WRPC.
- In the last few years, we have welcomed 34 adults as members and friends, not to mention their children!
- During a 2-year span of pandemic and subsequent economic upheaval, our congregation has remained, for the most part, physically and financially healthy. A forgiven federal loan of \$57,900 helped us to continue paying staff at their normal rate.
- The review of our 75-year history has confirmed what our faith assures us: that God is faithful to meet all our needs.

I pray for us, as Paul did for the church at Ephesus, that God "would unveil within you the unlimited riches of his glory and favor until supernatural strength floods your innermost being with his divine might and explosive power. Then, by constantly using your faith, the life of Christ will be released deep inside you, and the resting place of his love will become the very source and root of your life. Then you will be empowered to discover what every holy one experiences—the great magnitude of the astonishing love of Christ in all its dimensions. How deeply intimate and far-reaching is his love! How enduring and inclusive it is! Endless love beyond measurement that transcends our understand-ing—this extravagant love pours into you until you are filled to overflowing with the fullness of God! Sepsis: The Basics

Sepsis is an extreme response to an infection. Your body sends a flood of chemicals into your bloodstream to fight the threat. This causes widespread inflammation which, over time, can slow



blood flow and damage your organs. Sometimes sepsis can be life-threatening, especially if it moves to its later stages -- severe sepsis or septic shock. It's important to get help ASAP if you think you have it.

Symptoms



If you have sepsis, you already have a serious infection. Early symptoms include fever and feeling unwell, faint, weak, or confused. You may notice your heart rate and breathing are faster than usual. If it's

not treated, sepsis can harm your organs, make it hard to breathe, give you diarrhea and nausea, and mess up your thinking.

Who Gets Sepsis?

It's most common among the elderly, people with a long-term illness (like diabetes or cancer), those with a weakened immune system, and babies less than 3 months old. If you have sepsis you'll need to be in the hospital to get proper treatment.

How Do You Get It?

You can't catch sepsis from someone else. It happens inside your body, when an infection you already have -like in your skin, lungs, or urinary tract -- spreads or triggers an immune system response that affects other organs or systems. Most infections don't lead to sepsis.

Sepsis and Pregnancy

It's rare, but sepsis can happen when you're pregnant or shortly after pregnancy. Infections can come from bacteria that grow in the birth canal during pregnancy, or from an infection during vaginal births, cesarean sections, or abortions.

Sepsis From Wounds and Burns

Wounds, sores, or burns make sepsis more likely. When your skin is torn, bacteria on the outside can get inside. A burn that covers a large area can also throw your immune system out of whack. Most of the time, you're



not going to get sepsis when you have a cut or wound. Your body can usually repair itself, with treatment from your doctor if needed.

Sepsis From MRSA

MRSA (methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus) is a staph bacterial infection that resists many types of antibiotics. If it isn't treated, it can turn into sepsis. When it's on your skin, MRSA doesn't often cause serious problems. But if it gets into your body through a wound, it can.

Septic Shock

The most severe stage of sepsis is called septic shock. The heart and circulatory system begin to fail, and blood pressure drops. This slows blood flow to all your organs, and they begin to do poorly. You'll be admitted to the hospital ICU to get around-the-clock care.

Diagnosis

To diagnose sepsis, your doctor will ask a lot of questions and examine you carefully. Do you have a fever? What is your heart rate? Are you breathing fast? Are you breathing fast? Are you thinking clearly, or are you confused? They'll also do blood tests,



and if needed urine tests, a chest X-ray, or CT scan. The earlier you find out and begin treatment, the better.

Treatment

Early, aggressive treatment of sepsis is best. You may be admitted to a monitored bed or most likely go to the ICU. Your doctor will start you on antibiotics to fight the infection. You'll also get IV fluids, oxygen, and medicine to keep your blood pressure from falling and to support your body.

After Sepsis

People with sepsis can fully recover, though they may be more likely to get it again. Whether there are lasting effects depends in part on your age, whether you have a long-term disease, or how quickly you got treated for sepsis. Pumpkin Cheese Ball

This adorable cheese ball gets its pumpkin-orange coloring from ground-up cheese puffs and the stem is cleverly stolen from a bell pepper.

Yield: 10 to 12 servings

Ingredients:

- 3 cups orange cheese puffs
- 2 pounds cream cheese, at room temperature
- 3 cups shredded Cheddar
- 1/4 cup chopped chives
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 bell pepper with a long stem
- Crackers, for serving



Directions:

Put the cheese puffs in a food processor and process until finely ground. Transfer to a rimmed baking sheet.

Combine the cream cheese, Cheddar, chives, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper in a large bowl and mix to

combine. Mold the mixture into a ball, pressing the top of the ball with your hand to flatten it. With the tip of a butter knife, carve lines down the sides to resemble a pumpkin.

Roll the cheese ball in the ground cheese puffs. Remove the entire bell pepper stem with a paring knife and put it on top of the cheeseball as the pumpkin stem. Seed and slice the bell pepper. Serve the cheeseball on a plate with crackers and slices of bell pepper.
