


You are loved. We are blessed!



Stephen Minister Training Update

Our future Stephen Ministers will study and practice two topics on Saturday, March 11th. Please continue to keep Martha, Linda, Mark, Tom, Sharon, Dave, and Barbara in your prayers. Here is the lesson plan for this week:

Assertiveness: Relating Gently and Firmly (2 Parts) - Assertiveness has gained a bad name for itself in some circles of the church. It has been taken to mean "getting my own way," which is erroneous. In fact, assertiveness is about relating to others gently and firmly. In the first of two sessions on this topic, the Stephen Ministers will discuss and apply the principles they read about in the book *Speaking the Truth in Love: How to Be an Assertive Christian*, which uses Jesus as the model for assertive behavior. In the second part, they take a look at the differences between passive, aggressive, and assertive behavior. They also will be participating in a discussion about when they were assertive and also will be sharing affirmations for each member of the class.

Maintaining Boundaries in Caregiving: Our Stephen Ministers will discuss the importance of establishing boundaries both to protect themselves from manipulation and also to guard against their own controlling impulses.





Season of Mission ~ Season of Hope 2023 Rollout

Our Season of Mission ~ Season of Hope officially kicked off on February 28th with a very informative Zoom Presentation from staff at Appalachian Miles for Smiles. If you missed it, I encourage you to watch the recording on WRPC's YouTube channel and learn about the free care they provide to our neighbors in need.

You have additional opportunities this Season to join us on Zoom and learn about two more of the missions we support at WRPC. Zoom invitations will be provided just prior to each event.

Tuesday, March 14: Rachel Lawson will share how she became interested in supporting foster families, some of the challenges foster families face today, and how SMILE Foster Closet has been able to help.

Tuesday, March 21: Steve Young, Executive Director from Living Waters for the World will tell us how this ministry trains, equips and supports volunteers to work in partnership with international communities to install and sustain water purification systems.

You can also learn more about another ministry we support by checking out the Osman Hope display in the Narthex, prepared by Peter Borg.

We will sponsor two projects this year. Our service project gives you the opportunity to provide specific hygiene products needed by our Food Pantry clients, SMILE Foster Closet families, and the staff of the Child Care Center. If you are not able to shop, you may also make a monetary donation specifically for this project. Hygiene products may be dropped off in the bin in the Narthex through Sunday April 2.

What Are Cataracts?

A cataract is a progressive, painless clouding of the natural, internal lens of the eye. Cataracts block light, making it difficult to



see clearly. Over a period of time, cataracts can cause blindness, if not treated or removed. They're often related to growing older, but sometimes they can develop in younger people

How Cataracts Affect Your Vision

In a normal eye, light enters and passes through the lens. The lens focuses that light into a sharp image on the retina, which relays messages through the optic nerve to the brain. If the lens is cloudy from a cataract, the image you see will be blurry. Other eye conditions, such as myopia, cause blurry vision, too, but cataracts produce some distinctive signs and symptoms.

Cataract Symptom: Blurry Vision

Blurry vision at any distance is the most common symptom of cataracts. Your view may look foggy, filmy, or cloudy. Over time, as the cataracts get worse, less light reaches the retina. People with cataracts may have an especially hard time seeing and driving at night.

Cataract Symptom: Glare

Another early symptom of cataracts is glare, or sensitivity to light. You may have trouble seeing in bright sunlight. Indoor lights that once didn't bother you now may seem too bright or have halos. Driving at night may become a problem because of the glare caused by street lights and oncoming headlights.

Cataract Symptom: Double Vision

Sometimes, cataracts can cause double vision (also known as diplopia) when you look with one eye. This is different than the double vision that comes from the eyes not lining up properly, which would give you double vision when looking out of both eyes together. With cataracts, images can appear double even with just one eye open.

Cataract Symptom: Color Changes

Cataracts can affect your color vision, making some hues look faded. Your vision may gradually take on a brownish or yellowish tinge. At first, you may not notice this discoloration. But over time, it may make it harder to distinguish blues and purples.

Cataract Symptom: Second Sight

Sometimes, a cataract may temporarily improve a person's ability to see close-up, because the cataract acts as a stronger lens. This phenomenon is called second sight, because people who may have once needed reading glasses find that they don't need them anymore. As the cataract worsens however, this goes away and vision worsens again.

Cataract Symptom: New Prescription

Frequent changes to your eyeglass or contact lens prescription can be a sign of cataracts. This is because cataracts are usually progressive, meaning they get worse over time.

Who Gets Cataracts?

The majority of cataracts are related to aging. More than half of Americans over 65 have cataracts. Babies are sometimes born with cataracts, also called congenital cataracts, or children may develop them as a result of injury or illness. Exposure to Ultraviolet (UV) light can also increase the risk of cataract and other eye conditions.

What Causes Cataracts?

The exact cause of cataracts is unknown. While the risk grows as you get older, these factors may also contribute:

- * Diabetes
- * Smoking
- * Excess alcohol use
- * Eye Injury
- * Prolonged use of corticosteroids
- * Prolonged exposure to sunlight or radiation

How Are Cataracts Diagnosed?

Most cataracts can be diagnosed with an eye exam. Your eye doctor will test your vision and examine your eyes with a slit lamp microscope to look for problems with the lens and other parts of the eye. The pupils are dilated to better examine the back of the eye, where the retina and optic nerve lie.

Surgery for Cataracts

If you have vision loss caused by cataracts that can't be corrected with glasses or contact lenses, you may need surgery to remove the cataracts. In cataract surgery, the cloudy lens is removed and replaced with an artificial lens. The surgery, which is done on an outpatient basis, is safe and extremely effective at improving vision. If cataracts are present in both eyes, surgery will be done on one eye at a time.

Cataract Surgery Risks

Complications from cataract surgery are rare. The most common risks are bleeding, infection, and changes in eye pressure, which are all treatable when caught early. Surgery slightly raises the risk of retinal detachment, which requires emergency treatment. Sometimes, lens tissue left after surgery and used to support the intraocular lens implant can become cloudy, even years after surgery. This "after-cataract" is easily and permanently corrected with a laser.
