

Stephen Ministry Training Update



Our future Stephen Ministers will continue their training sessions on Saturday, April 8th.

STEPHEN First, they will learn about "Crisis **MINISTRY** Theory and Practice," which explores the effects of a crisis on people's lives

and how to help them move through the crisis toward greater wholeness.

They will reach the midpoint of their initial training when they study "Confidentiality," a crucial part of Stephen Ministry. Everything a care receiver tells a Stephen Minister, and even the identity of the care receiver, remains strictly confidential, which helps build a safe environment of trust and acceptance that God can use to bring hope and healing.

Their final training session for the 8th will be on "Caring between Visits: Caregiving and

Communications Technology," because while Stephen Ministry is primarily a face-to-face ministry, it may be necessary at times to use the phone and other communication tools to connect with their care receivers. This session explores how to evaluate these tools and use them in ways that enhances their ministry.

Please continue to pray Martha, Linda, Mark, and Tom as they learn key skills they will use regularly as Stephen Ministers and pray for Dave, Sharon, and Barbara as they prepare for and lead the sessions.

Mission Moment Update ...

April 2, 2023 One Great Hour of Sharing



Kintsugi (kint soo' gee) is the 15th-century Japanese art of repairing broken pottery by mending the broken areas with lacquer dusted or

mixed with powdered gold or other precious metal. It reminds us that when repaired, broken places can reveal new lines of character and beauty.

But what of God's world? The world God has entrusted to our care? So many parts are broken, damaged by cruelty to each other, misuse of Creation, or refusal to take God's commands seriously.

In Isaiah 58, the prophet reminds us, "You shall be called repairers of the breach." **Repairers.** And as we question the breaches that may have resulted from our actions, we ponder how to repair them, creating something unique, beautiful, and resilient. Which ones get our attention first? How can we repair a breach that may have existed for decades or one that has only recently emerged? Where can we work for repair to reveal beautiful new veins of gold?

Your gift to One Great Hour of Sharing next Sunday will provide a way for those whose lives have been affected by poverty, hunger, or disaster — whether natural or human-caused — to begin to repair the lives of their families and communities. It provides a way for the least of these, more often than not women and children, to become those veins of gold, binding their families and communities together in strength.

In the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, God repaired the breach that separated us from our Creator, performing a kintsugi of sorts upon us — putting the broken pieces of our lives back together while lining our broken places with the gold of God's grace.

For over 70 years, the offerings of thousands of congregations like ours have come together to help repair the breaches in our world. Through One Great Hour of Sharing, we are helping our neighbors in need through the ministries of the Presbyterian Hunger Program, which will receive 36% of the offering, the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, which will receive 32%, and Self-Development of People, which will also receive 32%.

Last year, our church family gave over \$1,400 to the One Great Hour of Sharing Special Offering. With our sisters and brothers in other congregations, we will work together to help repair the breaches in our world.

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Hymn Stories Jesus Christ is Risen Today

Writing the story of this hymn is a task complicated by the hymn's early origins, the many changes that it has undergone through the centuries, and the conflicting dates and data found in the various sources that I consulted.

Another problem is that it is possible to confuse this hymn with "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today." While the words to the two hymns are different, the first lines are similar. No serious musician will be confused by the similarity, but most of the people in the pews aren't serious musicians.

Also, there are two tunes associated with these two hymns — "Easter Hymn" and "Llanfair" — and I found both hymns sung to both tunes, depending on the hymnal. In most cases, a hymnal will include one hymn or the other, but some hymnals have both. When both are included, one hymn will be sung to one tune and the other hymn to the other tune.

There is a variant of "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today" without the Alleluias (and sometimes without the verse that starts "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today"), and there are at least three tunes associated with that hymn—"Orientis Partibus," "Savannah," and "Resurrexit."

The History

• This hymn had its origins in a 14th century Latin carol, "Surrexit Christus hodie," the author of which is entirely anonymous.

- It was translated into English by Nahum Tate (a poet laureate) and Nicholas Brady (an Anglican clergyman) and paired with the tune "Easter Hymn" in the book Lyra Davidica in 1708.
- Then after major revisions and with new stanzas, it was published in Arnolds Compleat Psalmodist in 1779.
- The stanza that begins, "Sing we to our God above," was written in 1740 by Charles Wesley and added much later – apparently long after the 1779 publication of Compleat Psalmodist.

Now to the tunes! "Easter Hymn" comes from Lyra Davidica (1708). The composer is unknown.

"Llanfair" was written by Robert Williams (1781-1821), a blind basket weaver who composed tunes and dictated them to a scribe. Williams lived on the Isle of Anglesey in Wales.

"Llanfair" is an abbreviated form for the name of a Welsh village with a very long Welch name, which means "Church of St. Mary in the hollow of white hazel near the rapid whirlpool of the Church of St. Tysillio by the red cave."

On a modern map, I found a village named Llanfair on the mainland in Wales 25 miles (40 km) south of the Isle of Anglesey. I also found a village named Llanfairfechan on the island itself. I have not been able to determine which of those villages is the one associated with this hymn tune. – Richard Niell Donovan, *sermonwriter.com*
