Hello church family,



Mission Moment Update... April 21, 2024—Season of Mission Update

This update shares where we ended up with our Mission Action Plan giving this past year and also provides an update of your generous pledging during our recent Season of Mission for the 2024-25 Mission Action Plan. For last year, we received pledges totaling \$35,575. Actual giving came in at \$42,025 or 118% of the pledged amount. We disbursed \$46,116 from the Mission Action Plan, \$4,425 from designated funds and \$1,900 from our mini-grant program. Thanks to you, Waverly Road definitely made an impact on neighbors in need locally, regionally and around the world.

For the 2024-25 Mission Action Plan, we are very excited to report we have received pledges totaling \$75,550! This is an amazing 212% of last year's pledges!! So far, we have received \$12,850 in actual giving. We are well positioned to make significant impacts on the organizations we choose to support this coming year.



Finally we want to report on the service projects we conducted as part of our Season of Mission. For the Food Pantry, we received toilet paper, toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap and canned goods in addition to cash donations of \$180 which enabled us to purchase even more toilet paper which is the most often requested item not in the standard bag.

For Oasis of Kingsport, we received numerous personal care products, paper towels, foil, food storage bags, and kitchen towels in addition to cash donations of \$400 which will be used to purchase more of the items they most need. Lastly, our children and youth along with a few young at heart adults decorated 148 white paper bags for use in First Presbyterian's Friendship Diner to hand out Grab and Go breakfasts with a little extra love.

The Mission Committee extends a sincere thank you for your amazing generosity. We are excited to be able to share generously with our neighbors in need again this year in the name of Jesus Christ.

April 18, 2024 – Requesting a refill at the local pharmacy or getting a complete series of a specific chemotherapy is becoming hit-and-miss as problems with the pharmaceutical supply chain mount.

Drug shortages have reached record levels, hitting a new peak of 323 medicines in the U.S. for which demand has exceeded supply during the first 3 months of 2024. That tops the record of 320 active shortages in 2014, according to a professional group that tracks the problems along with the University of Utah.

The shortages extend broadly beyond blockbuster injectable weight loss drugs. They include numerous antibiotics and medicines for problems with the heart and blood vessels.

Stephen Ministry at Waverly Road



Stephen Ministry is a caring ministry we have here at Waverly Road Presbyterian Church. It involves specially trained congregation members, called Stephen Ministers, who provide one-to-one Christian care to people who are experiencing a life

challenge or transition.

As a Stephen Ministry congregation, we're part of something big. There are more than 13,000 enrolled congregations. Stephen Ministry congregations are from more than 192 different Christian denominations and come from all 50 states, 10 Canadian provinces, and 30 other countries. More than 80,000 pastors, church staff, and laypeople have been trained as Stephen Ministers.

Stephen Ministry was developed in 1975 by Dr. Kenneth Haugk, a pastor and clinical psychologist, who saw that he alone could not provide for all the caring ministry needs in his congregation. He began training laypeople, called Stephen Ministers, to help provide high-quality Christian care. The ministry was so successful that other churches became interested and Dr. Haugk founded the not-for-profit Stephen Ministries St. Louis organization, which produces and delivers resources and training to support Stephen Ministry in thousands of congregations.

Thanks to the vision and hard work of Sharon Petke, our church has had Stephen Ministry since 2008. In that time, we have trained 28 of our members as Stephen Ministers. Since we began, Stephen Ministry 16 years ago, we estimate that our Stephen Ministers have provided well over 300 hours of one-to-one caring to care receivers both in our congregation and to people outside the congregation.

Each of the current and former Stephen Ministers wish to express our thanks and appreciation to Sharon, who has spent countless number of hours working to make her vision a reality by training Stephen Ministers, planning, organizing, leading the Supervision meetings, and providing care to several care receivers herself. Sharon retired in September, 2023, after 15 years of service. Thank you very much Sharon. You are missed!!

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National Drug Shortages Hit Record Levels, *cont'd.*

"Some of the most worrying shortages involve generic sterile injectable medications, including cancer chemotherapy drugs and emergency medications stored in hospital crash carts and procedural areas. Ongoing national shortages of therapies for attention-deficit/ hyperactivity disorder also remain a serious challenge for clinicians and patients," wrote American Society of Health-System Pharmacists CEO Paul W. Abramowitz, PharmD, in his most recent blog post.

The American Society of Health-System Pharmacists and the University of Utah's Drug Information Service collect voluntary shortage reports and maintain a database of drug shortages.

In some cases, people searching for their next dose of scarce medications like the diabetes drug Ozempic and its weight loss counterpart Wegovy last year turned to substitutes, such as compounded versions, that can result in side effects. The situation led the FDA to warn people to avoid compounded versions and to be alert that some drugs may be marketed as having the same active ingredient, when instead they contained a salt formulation that had not been shown to be safe or effective.

Ozempic is no longer listed as experiencing an active shortage, but Wegovy still can be difficult to find. Ozempic and Wegovy are both made by Novo Nordisk and use the same active ingredient, semaglutide. The semaglutide shortage began in 2022, according to the American Society of Health-System Pharmacists' database.

The FDA also maintains a shortage list and recently added most doses of another new and popular weight loss injectable drug called Zepbound (its generic name is tirzepatide). The version of tirzepatide used for diabetes is called Mounjaro, and both are made by Eli Lilly. The shortage comes just months after Zepbound was approved by the FDA, and the agency says "limited availability" is likely to persist through at least June this year.
