Barnabas Ministry at WRPC Completes 25 Years of Encouraging College Students

In 1998, Susan Lodal and Charlene Combs, a retired school librarian, began this ministry at our church. Since then, members of Waverly Road have been secretly paired with college students throughout the school year. Adult volunteers encourage their students by lifting them up in prayer and sending notes of encouragement and care packages. The students may be living at home or they may be attending school far from home. There are times when all of us can benefit from prayer, an encouraging word sent through the mail, or a care package; our college students are no exception.

This past Thursday, July 25th, we participated in the annual Barnabas Reveal at which time the Barnabas was introduced to the student to whom she provided encouragement to during the 2023-2024 school year. The students participating in the program for the 2023-2024 school year were Gillian Marlow, Laura Whipple, and Marshall Palmer. The reveal was done by Zoom in order to accommodate the students or graduates who are currently living and/or working out of town. Each of the Barnabas volunteers are sending their student a restaurant gift card.

Why is the Barnabas Program important to our college students? Studies have shown that more than two thirds of young Protestants will stop attending church for at least a year between the ages of 18 and 22. This occurs for many reasons. But what is important is that those that come back, choose to do so partially because of the relationships that they have sustained with members of their church family.

Barbara Lane served as coordinator last year and plans to for 2024-2025. The coordinator is the go-between person between the Barnabas and the student and who makes the assignments at the beginning of the school year.

We are kicking off the program for the School Year of 2024-2025. We need students enrolled in college and people willing to be a Barnabas to a student. If you know of student who will be enrolled in college for the school year 2024-2025 or are willing to be a Barnabas to a student, please contact Barbara Lane.

Please be in prayer for this ministry, which is part of Adult Ministry at WRPC, as we provide encouragement to the students, who are starting a new adventure or continuing his/her education. They will be our future leaders. We hope this ministry continues at WRPC for many years.

What Do Stephen Ministers Do?



You have seen two terms used frequently in The Newsheet over many months recently: Stephen Ministers and Stephen Leaders. What's the difference? Why do we **MINISTRY** have both at WRPC? You read the reflections of a Stephen Minister

in last week's Newsheet, written by Martha Lawson. This week, we'll look at the role of the Stephen Leader.

Training.

Stephen Ministers receive 50 hours of training locally, usually taught by Stephen Leaders or other Stephen Ministers. That training prepares the Stephen Ministers to care for persons in their church or community who are facing challenges in their lives. You have read in previous articles about some of the many types of challenges with which the listening ear of a Stephen Minister might help.

The Stephen Leader, on the other hand, is responsible for seeing that the overall program runs according to the needs of the care receivers and to the limitations set out by the parent organization: Stephen Ministries St. Louis. A Stephen Leader receives a week's worth of training. When Barbara Lane and I took the Leader's training, we went away to another city (I went to Orlando, FL) to an intensive training session which ran mornings, afternoons and evenings, Sunday night through Saturday noon. More recently, and thanks to COVID, Leader's training is done online using Zoom®. Susan Foster and Linda Qualls were trained this way.

Duties.

The Leaders have several roles: supervision, awareness, referrals and training. Fortunately, we at WRPC have four Stephen Leaders and each of us handles one of those tasks. In addition to overseeing the whole program, I handle the supervision function; Barbara focusses on awareness, writing the weekly columns for The Newsheet, for example. Susan is our referrals coordinator, matching new care receivers with a Stephen Minister who she thinks is best suited to help him or her with their specific situations; and Linda leads our training programs for future Stephen Ministers.

Overlap.

Although it is not required that a Stephen Leader be a trained Stephen Minister, we are blessed at Waverly Road that all four of our Leaders are fully trained Stephen Ministers also. This means that although the four primarily serve the leadership functions of Stephen Ministry, they can additionally serve as Stephen Ministers. And in fact, some have done so.

I hope that helps you better understand the two terms -Stephen Minister and Stephen Leader. And if you have questions about Stephen Ministry at all, please contact me, Dave Petke, in person, by phone or by e-mail.
